

The Millennium School Dubai conducted a Round Square Conference on the 13th and 14th June, 2021. Four hundred students from fifty prestigious schools around Dubai and India participated in this two-day

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learning event. The theme 'The Art of Growing Up' – a collaboration towards shaping the minds and hearts of the future' was based on the Round Square ideals of Internationalism, Leadership and Service.

The teacher escort Ms Vitasta Dutta mentored by Ms Shalini Dahiya RS Rep Modern School, Barakhamba Road encouraged and motivated the students throughout the event. Modern School delegates comprised six students: Sukoon Kaushal(S5-G), Ananya Dhawan(S5-I), Adhiraj Mahajan(S5-D), Sahavaasi Suryadevara(S5-B), Serena Sabharwal(S5-D) and Yashve Rai(S5G).



The first day, programme started with a meet-greet and inauguration ceremony, followed by a keynote address and workshop by Mr Patrick C. Ehler on 'Emotional Intelligence'. Later, Ms Gulshan Kavarana introduced Sign Language to the students. It was indeed an enlightening experience and creatively guided the students about the numbers and alphabets used in sign language.

A total of fifteen Baraza Groups with an average of thirty participants were organised and the topics included: Resilience, Autonomy, Optimism, Kindness, Communication, Creativity and Innovation, Gratitude, Positive Relationships, Motivation, Spirituality and many more. They catered to the student's physical as well as emotional well-being.

The next day, Dr Gilda Scarfe, who is the Chief Executive Officer and also the founder of Positive Ed, addressed the students, by putting some very simple, but extremely deep meaning questions related to our schools and the future.

The following speech was by Mr Gaurav Kapoor, who is an Indian actor. He made the students realize the need to develop a never dying spirit of inquisitiveness by unfolding some incidents of his life which were strongly linked with the words "Why? and How?".

The two-day conference not only enabled the students to connect with their inner selves, but it also contributed in the enhancement of communication skills. The delegates got an opportunity to make some new friends during interactive sessions.

The Round Square Virtual Conference, was conducted by the Craighouse school, Chile on Thursday, 17th June 2021. The three-hour long event involved discussions around the topic: "Living in a boundless world – Lifting everyone up without pushing anyone out". Two hundred students from twenty-seven schools in Vancouver, London, Buenos Aires, Johannesburg, Nairobi, Dubai, India and Bangkok participated in the event.

Six students from Modern school- Aditi Tuli (S7-J), Aryan Dawer (S7-C), Janav Bansal (S7-C), Karen Kakkar (S7-B), Parnika Bhardwaj (S6-B) and Rohan Bhasin (S7-C) comprised the Modern School delegation.



In the main event activity, the hosts presented a video on the topic of inclusion made by them which was followed by a Kahoot game where the attendees were asked definitions of common terms related to migration and some general facts pertaining to it.

The delegates were sent to the respective Baraza groups where they participated in discussion about the most important cultural influence of the students' life, their family's

history with migration and pre-existing notions about being a migrant as well as how the process of cultural transition can be made easier. The three panelists (immigrants currently living in Chile) told us how throughout their lives, they had to move to different countries.

The delegation advanced to the final Baraza session where it had to design an activity to make new migrants feel closer to cultures at a school. All delegates came up with exciting propositions which were finally discussed in the main meeting leading to a wholesome end to a wonderful Conference.
